A soft, cozy spot for babies and toddlers to relax—and a wonderful spot for tummy time!

Fabric Requirements, as shown

- 1¹/₄ yards T-Rex Digital Cuddle[®] Graphite, *Top*
- 1¼ yards Luxe Cuddle® Sorbet Paradise, Bottom
- ¹/₂ yard Cuddle[®] 3 Navy, *Piping*

Suggested Notions

- 4 yards, Cotton piping cord, 1¹/₂" diameter
- Batting, Twin-Size (We recommend Quilters Dream Puff from Quilters Dream Batting.)
- Heavy string or twine, 1 yard, for drawing the circle template
- 90/14 stretch machine needle
- Polyester thread
- Felt tip marker or ballpoint pen
- Rotary cutter and mat
- Micro-serrated scissors and/or craft knife
- Long, flower head pins and/or fabric clips
- Stiletto
- Point turner
- Basting spray
- Zipper foot, *optional*
- Walking foot

Note: For safety's sake, never leave a baby unattended on the Play Mat. Stuffed animal patterns by Funky Friends Factory.

Cutting


- 1. From the *Top*, cut:
 - 1 (40" x 40") square.
- 2. From the *Bottom*, cut:
 - 1 (40" x 40") square.
- 3. From the navy, cut:
 - 3 (5" x WOF*) strips for Piping
- 4. From batting, cut:
 - 2 (45" x 45") squares.

Assembly

Make the Top Circle

Note: Only the Top Circle is cut using this process.


- 1. Fold 40" Top Circle Mark Inter point of folds square into quarters, with right sides together, creating a 20" square. Mark the center point.
- 2. Pin the four layers in several places to secure for cutting.
- 3. Tie a felt tip marker or ballpoint pen to the end of the twine.
- 4. From the pen, measure and trim the string to 20".
- 5. Place the cut end at the center mark of the folded square. Draw the arc.
- 6. Cut on the line to create the Top Circle.



Circle to match the Top Circle. Note: Add a few pins if needed to secure the layers while cutting.

Add the batting

- 1. Spray baste the wrong side of both the Top and Bottom Circles. Smooth each onto a
- batting square. 2. Zigzag the edges of each circle to a batting square.
- 3. Trim excess batting.
- Prepare the piping




Note: Check that the nap is going in the same direction before sewing.

2. Place the cording along the center of the wrong side of the Piping.

Tip: Spray baste the wrong side of the piping to help hold the cording in place while you sew.

3. Loosely fold the piping over the cording. Baste ¹/₂" from the raw edges to enclose the cording.



Sew the Cording to the Top Circle

1. With cut edges aligned, pin the piping around the Top Circle.

Note: Do not trim piping ends.

2. Starting 4" from the start of the piping, sew to Top Circle. Stop before reaching the end of the loose piping.

> *Note: Sew along the stitch line* enclosing the cording. A zipper foot *will help keep the stitching line* snug—but not too tight.

- 3. Pin the last inches of piping to meet the beginning. Mark 1" beyond the place they meet.
- 4. Unpick basting stitches. Cut on the mark. Sew ends together.

Note: Pull the cording out of the way while sewing the piping.

5. Trim cording ends to fit. Sew last 8" of piping to Top Circle.

Cuddle[®] Basics

- 1. Mark measurements on the wrong side of Cuddle® with a felt tip marker or ballpoint pen.
- 2. Cut Cuddle[®] with a rotary cutter, craft knife, or scissors.
- 3. Shake cut pieces or put in a no-heat dryer with a damp washcloth for a few minutes to remove loose fibers.
- 4. Sew with polyester thread in the top and the bobbin.
- 5. Reduce presser foot pressure when sewing multiple layers.

Finishing

here the

- 1. Mark an 8" turning gap on the Bottom Circle.
- 2. With right sides together and naps in the same direction, pin the Top to the Bottom Circle.
- 3. Sew around the edge, making an L-Pivot at the gap ends.

Note: The L-Pivot secures the ends when turning and helps the seam allowance turn in.



- 4. Pin the turning gap closed.
- 5. Hand sew with a ladder stitch.




Ladder Stitch: Catch one side of opening, then the other. Pull to tighten every few stitches. Check that both sides are caught in the hand sewing.

- 6. Increase stitch length to 2.5-4 mm.
- 7. Double pin by using 2 rows of pinsthe first row every 11/2" along the seam line and a second row 1" to the left and parallel to the cut edge.
- 8. Backstitch at the beginning and end of each seam.
- 9. Seam allowances are 1/2" unless otherwise noted.

10. Use an even-feed or walking foot, if possible. It makes a difference!
